With Valentine's Day on the horizon, it's wise to remember that you shouldn't give your dog sweet treats. We all know how harmful chocolate can be for a dog, but

did you know the harm that can come from anything containing Xylitol? This artificial sweetener may be good for dieters but it's not good for your pet if they consume it. Ingesting it can cause a rapid drop in blood sugar levels, it can cause seizures and worst still liver damage. It is used in medicines and foods as a sugar substitute, so always check your labels carefully for Xylitol (E967) and contact your vet immediately if you suspect your dog has eaten any.



Letter from the Reverend Christine Hawkins

Dear Friends

I'm writing in January, and so I wish you, on behalf of our worshipping communities, a Happy New Year.

The beginning of a new year gives us pause to reflect on the past year, and look forward to the next and what it may bring. We're also in the liturgical season of Epiphany, and our Sunday readings fit in with that new-year feeling, giving us a variety of 'new starts' to reflect on.



We begin with the Epiphany itself – the new-born king revealed to the Magi, Emmanuel, shown to the world. A new start of great hope and expectation – and yet it is overshadowed with danger and uncertainty. The Magi's visit unwittingly led to the Holy Family's flight into Egypt and the slaughter of the innocents.

The Baptism of Christ follows, when the adult Jesus appears, ready to take up his ministry. The Holy Spirit descends on him, and Jesus hears his Father's words 'This is my Son'. But he faces a challenge too, going out into the desert to work out what form that ministry should take.

Then we'll hear about Jesus calling the first disciples. They come with such excitement, forgetting their own plans – but not knowing, not understanding, what they were called to. Jesus proclaims that the kingdom of heaven has come near – but we know the way to new life and resurrection lies through the cross.

So, January is a good time to think about new starts. For some of us this year will bring a new start, filled with hope and excitement. Others may be more aware of the difficulties and challenges that lie ahead. And some will be expecting little change, just more of the same. Many of us will find ourselves facing an unwanted and unexpected new start, which has been forced upon us through the death of a loved one; the loss of a relationship or a job.

Whatever our situation, we stand on the brink of this new year with many questions and a great deal of uncertainty about the future, both personally, in the local community, nationally and internationally, but also within the life of our church.

Our Area Bishop has called us to a 'Congress' with him at the end of this month, which will reveal the current financial state of the diocese and how that

will impact on our local churches. There is a considerable challenge to be faced, and the PCC's and I will try to pick our way through the uncertainties to discover how 'church' might be sustained in our beautiful rural communities.

The church faces a 'new start', but, as the stories of Epiphany teach us, this new start will require us to travel the way of the cross; through loss, suffering and discomfort. This will mean facing our own "sacred cows" (to quote our Prime Minister), but not as those without hope, for we know that God travels with us in the shadow of the cross and leads us to Easter Time – the season of hope and re-birth. Please pray for us as we pray for you.

A Tribute to Henry Hart

22nd October 1934 – 4th February 2018

A few days after Henry's funeral service Jackie Hart, Henry's wife, agreed for me to do a tribute to Henry in the Fyfield Focus. Although I put a short notice in the Focus after Henry's funeral service I didn't fulfil this commitment until now to pay a tribute to this talented, interesting and special person.

Henry and Jackie met in 1961. Henry was living and working in London and although he was a qualified draftsman he now owned and ran a large and very upmarket garage in Golders Green selling and hiring out Rolls Royces, Bentleys, etc. Jackie was living and working in New York, and was promoting USA tourism to the UK. Jackie needed to fulfil an assignment of hiring a Rolls Royce with a full time chauffeur for two weeks for the actress Elizabeth Taylor, who was visiting London, and she contacted Henry's garage and came over to London to meet Henry.

Henry visited New York frequently to see Jackie and despite Henry knowing that Jackie didn't want to move back to the UK (Jackie had been living in New York for 11 years) he asked Jackie to marry him, asking her to live in the UK for six months whilst he dealt with his growing business interests. Henry and Jackie married in 1962 and in 1964 they had a son Bradley, followed by a daughter Samantha in 1972, and between them they provided Henry and Jackie with three grandsons; Henry, Charlie and Piers. Although they visited the US many times Jackie never returned to New York to live!

Henry was already involved with inventing security items for motor and marine businesses, which were patented and successfully manufactured by himself, and other leading companies in this field, in the USA and Australia. These included the Hook lock (the forerunner to the crook lock), Bari-Nuts used on car and boat engines and also Prison Alarms. Henry's initial motivation for car security was driven by his car being stolen when he took a girl to the cinema to see a Jerry Lewis and Dean Martin film; he vowed that no one would ever steal one of his cars again. He moved into Housing Development with his first large housing estate being built in 1974 in Folkestone. This consisted of 41 individually designed homes called 'The Masters', with each one being named after a great artist. His last building development was a block of flats in Woodford, in around 2010.

Henry and Jackie moved from Chigwell to Fyfield in August 2004. In 2006 Henry got involved with the Fyfield Parish Appraisal and Action plan, with the

first official meeting being held in September 2006 where Henry was appointed Chairman and a constitution was agreed. In March 2007, Ian Hadley was co-opted onto the Committee and this was when Ian first met Henry. I first came into contact with Henry when he responded to an advert I placed in the Fyfield Focus asking if anyone was interested in learning to play bridge – this was the summer of 2007.

Henry joined the Beginners course in January 2008 and also signed-up for the Intermediate course in October that same year. Unfortunately he didn't carry on with Bridge so didn't become a member of the Fyfield Bridge Club, which opened in November 2008. This was a great shame because Henry was very well liked by all the bridge delegates. He had a great sense of humour, was very sociable, interesting, had presence and was always immaculately dressed; which impressed us all.

However both Ian and I still had contact with Henry and his wife Jackie, and Henry would often contact Ian about Parish Council matters. He was a huge supporter of the Fyfield Focus and would often provide input to the Focus and, as Henry was a keen and talented photographer, I also received some wonderful photographs from him.

Henry always paid attention to detail and this was probably due to his engineering talent. He was also interested and knowledgeable about a broad spectrum of subjects and particularly local issues.

Henry battled cancer for many years but, due to his love of life and family, he was always researching the latest developments and sought expert advice in an effort to help him conquer his battle. He was a very determined and courageous man.

Henry's funeral service took place at the City of London Cemetery and Crematorium on 15th February, 2018. The Chapel was filled to capacity with family and many friends. There were many wonderful tributes to Henry but his grandsons Henry, Charlie and Piers really did him proud with very loving tributes paid to their Papa; helping one another when they struggled to deliver their messages. It was obvious how important their Papa was to them and how much positive influence Henry had in their lives. It was a wonderful tribute to a very talented, interesting, successful and very caring person, who also had a great sense of humour.

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
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Dr Walker's School

SOME MEMORIES OF DWELLING IN FYFIELD

- When we moved here, 50 years ago, there was a petrol pump on the corner of Queen Street, just about where the bus shelter is now. Perhaps there was also a small garage that sold petrol.
- Where the chandelier cleaning office is now, there used to be a Rolls Royce garage that sold and serviced such vehicles.
- Cracks were found on the bridge over the river on the bend in Queen Street. Therefore, the bridge was removed and a new one was installed. This was highly inconvenient for those wishing to traverse locally but bliss for those of us living this side of the bridge.
- Some years ago, a large number of police officers forbade access to Cannons Lane as, allegedly, a stash of Kalashnikov AK47 rifles was being marketed by a resident living down the Lane.
- Along Willingale Road in the field on the right, waterlogged and overgrown now, and just before the church, you would see a bonfire grow to an enormous size in October, to be lit on 5 November in a communal firework area, with burgers and hotdogs for sale too. It was organised by the local school PTA, I think.
- At least two cars have been seen floating in the river near the bridge over the years. One was pushed in as, shall we say, a student prank! The other was driven into the water with the driver being fuelled not by petrol but by, well I'm sure you can guess.
- A canvasser recently calling to promote a local MP commented that he knew our house and that his relative named Jacobsen was our rector years ago. I knew the name and remembered that the reverend, invalided in a wheelchair, had travelled away for the day but he should have been attending and conducting a funeral at the church. Family and mourners were left in limbo while he was visiting the canvasser, his grandson, in Canterbury.
- I once witnessed a neighbour securing trellis to the front wall of his house. As I rested from my toils that day, I observed a high wind take control of the trellis, which resulted in the collapse of the small stepladders supporting both the neighbour and the trellis. Thankfully my neighbour came to no physical harm.
- A toilet was being installed in the vestry of the church and to repay a kindness I agreed to assist with the plumbing. A friend assisted me one day

at the church, as I needed to secure a fitting. The friend inadvertently nudged the lid of the cistern, which fell, hit the stone floor and shattered. To this day, you will see where the lid has been superglued back together. It was an end-of-range model at a 'knock down' price. Unable to finish making the fittings water tight, I departed on holiday. I thought that I had left a note for the rector to this effect. Perhaps this was an oversight, as a little later on the rector flushed the toilet and unfortunately the vestry floor flooded!

- Finally, not so much a memory but, there is a walk within the boundaries of the village where on some pleasant mornings a herd of deer, gently grazing, can be espied by quiet explorers.

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Ongar Wildlife Society (OWLS)

At the December meeting, Dr Brian Rosen from the Natural History Museum gave an interesting and informative talk entitled Christmas Corals (yes, Corals!). He also included the coral's near relatives, jellyfish and sea anemones. Although these three groups look quite dissimilar, they all possess specialised stinging cells, which they use to capture their prey and to defend themselves.



Corals are under threat due to warming of the seas as a consequence of global climate change and Brian and other scientists throughout the world are monitoring changes in their abundance and distribution.

Warmer sea temperatures can result in coral bleaching when corals expel the green or golden-brown algae living in their tissues, causing the coral to turn completely white. Corals can survive a bleaching event, but they are under more stress and subject to mortality. This is because corals and algae have a mutualistic relationship. The coral provides the algae with a protected environment and compounds they need for photosynthesis. In return, the algae produce oxygen, help the coral to remove wastes and supply the coral with essential nutrients.

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

‘Coffee with Cops’ At Fyfield Village Hall

I am pleased to report the attendance at the last Coffee with Cops session on Friday 29th November was very well attended by 17 residents. I am ashamed to admit this was my first attendance despite hearing from many people that these are informative sessions and now having attended a session I totally agree.

PCSO Laura Ashcroft (Police Community Support Officer) was in attendance and spent time speaking with individuals on a one-to-one basis and also some attendees raised their questions or issues so everyone could hear the points they were raising and also hear Laura’s response. Some of the items raised related to:

- The reporting of incidents – good and bad experiences
- County Lines (The practice of trafficking drugs into rural areas and smaller towns, away from major cities.)
- Speeding Through the Village
- Enquiring about a burglary incident on Queen Street

The key take-away from the above items for me were:

Reporting of Incidents: Be aware the 101 number is manned by the same team as the 999 emergency number, so when they are dealing with a lot of emergency calls you will be kept waiting. If you are waiting for a long time and it is not an emergency or you do not need a time critical response, then consider going to the website (www.essex.police.uk) where you can report your concern or incident and you will get a report no. and will be called back. Don’t forget you can call your local PC Paul Harrison but bear in mind if he doesn’t respond immediately he works shifts.

County Lines: Drug traffickers & runners will always try to park their car where they can get a quick get-away e.g. close to a junction. So if you see an unfamiliar car parked close to a junction and you see some suspicious activity report it.

Speeding Through the Village: The statistics from Community Speed Monitoring do help the police target problem areas. Unfortunately, despite people being bothered by the speeding through our village, the Fyfield Parish Council has not been able to attract volunteers from the community to continue to carry-out community speed monitoring.

There is a lot of useful information on the Essex Police website which is worth looking at and I thought the session was very informative; particularly the open session where we could share information.

The next Coffee with Cops date is as yet unknown. Please look out for posters advertising future dates in the village store and posts on the Fyfield & Moreton Grapevine Facebook page.


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Local Policing Courier Fraud Warning



Essex Police have warned of increased incidences of courier fraud in our area. Courier fraud occurs when a fraudster contacts victims by telephone purporting to be a police officer or bank official. To substantiate this claim, the caller might be able to confirm some easily obtainable basic details about the victim such as their full name and address. After some trust has been established, the fraudster will then describe a scenario such as;

- Some money has been removed from a victim's bank account and staff at their local bank branch are responsible.
- Suspects have already been arrested but the "police" need money for evidence.
- A business such as a jewellers or currency exchange is operating fraudulently and they require assistance to help secure evidence.

Victims are then asked to co-operate in an investigation by attending their bank and withdrawing money, withdrawing foreign currency from an exchange or purchasing an expensive item to hand over to a courier for examination who will also be a fraudster. At the time of handover, unsuspecting victims are promised the money they've handed over or spent will be reimbursed but in reality there is no further contact and the money is never seen again.

Please be alert to this fraud and report any suspicious activity.

If you see something suspicious or out of the ordinary in the local area then please report it to our local police officer *first* before posting on social media sites. Our local PC Paul Harrison is frequently out on patrol in and around Ongar and the surrounding villages and can therefore respond quickly to reports, potentially thwarting criminal activity before it happens. Policing needs our community engagement and interaction and relies on intelligence information coming from us, the public. So if you see any suspicious activity or behaviour, please notify Paul in the first instance as he may well be in a position to respond and investigate immediately. His contact details are:

Together with a number of ‘reps’ from the various parishes, Claire has worked hard to establish and share ideas to help reduce, reuse and recycle on a village level, often with the support of the Parish Councils.

Together with Nina Hall at Little Hadham Stores, a very successful Beeswax Wrap Workshop was held at the end of last year. Beeswax wraps are a great, reusable alternative to cling film, which cannot generally be recycled. Due to the growing popularity of beeswax wraps you can now find them to buy in many shops and supermarkets, however you can also make them yourself! Nina was a fantastic tutor and has kindly circulated instructions that can be followed at home, which I include for you to have a go with!



The items needed can be purchased from Little Hadham Stores, as well as other retailers.



A huge well done to Market Lane Dental in Mill Lane, which has become Dunmow’s drop off point in the Colgate Recycling Programme. You can now drop off any brand of electric and battery operated toothbrush heads, any brand of toothbrushes, any brand of toothpaste tubes and caps, any brand of toothpaste outer packaging and any brand of toothpaste cartons to the collection point. The collected waste is then sent on to TerraCycle who extract the polymers and make new recycled products. Another fantastic recycling opportunity in the community that will hopefully be used by as many residents as possible.

10 Green Parishes is planning a small 'Make Do and Mend' workshop at the end of February. If you're not a member of the 10 Green Parishes Facebook group yet do consider joining, it is a great source of information and the first place to find out more information about upcoming events and workshops.

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DIY Reuseable Beeswax Wraps

You Will Need:

Cotton or linen fabric cut to desired size (this recipe makes enough to approx cover three 25cm x 25cm pieces)

25g natural beeswax*
12g natural pine resin*
1 tbsp jojoba oil

old, clean, glass jar, saucepan, spoon to stir, oven tray, baking paper, a small paint or basting brush (keep this brush for this purpose only), pegs for hanging the wraps while they dry.

Method:

- 1 Preheat your oven to 150 degrees C.
- 2 Place the beeswax, resin and jojoba oil into your jar into a saucepan filled with water half way up the jar. Place the saucepan onto the stove, turn to medium heat and melt the contents of the jar, stirring occasionally. Resin takes longer to melt than beeswax, so it's best to have the heat on medium to high initially and then turn down the water in the saucepan to simmering.
- 3 Place baking paper over the oven tray and place your fabric flat on top. Once the beeswax mixture has completely melted, use a spoon and drizzle the mixture evenly over the fabric.
- 4 Place the tray into the pre-heated oven for about 2 minutes to reheat. Carefully pull the oven tray out and use your basting brush to spread the mixture quite thick and evenly over the fabric. Don't forget the edges and corners.
- 5 Pop it back into the oven for a minute to 'melt out' and any uneven bumps or clumps. You can turn the fabric over to make sure both sides are covered. You can do this as many times as you like until you are satisfied with the result. Remove from oven and hang up with pegs on a hanger to let set and dry.

How To Use:

These reusable beeswax wraps are an excellent alternative to plastic cling film and zip lock bags. Wrap up cut up fruit and veggies, sandwiches and cover plates and bowls.

To store, fold neatly and keep in a cool dry place, such as a kitchen drawer.

To clean, wipe down after use with a damp cloth and allow to air dry. You can wash, using a mild natural detergent in cool water and air dry. Avoid hot water as it will melt the wax. You can place them back in a low oven for 30 seconds to sterilise them. You can also use a block of wax to refresh them as they get older, or make some more.

Not suitable for the dishwasher or washing machine.

Do not heat in microwave.

Do not use with raw meat.



In May this year we have the Moreton, Bobbingworth and Laver Parish Council election, the Fyfield Parish Council election and the Epping Forest District Council election for the Moreton & Fyfield Ward.

My own Christmas EFDC duties and invites this year included:

- Christmas by Candlelight at Waltham Abbey, by invitation of the EFDC Chairman and the Mayor of Waltham Abbey Town Council, with a full congregation and an outstanding choir, followed by mince pies at the Town Hall.
- Nine Lessons & Carols at All Saints Church, High Laver, led by Reverend Chris Hawkins, once again with a beautiful choir and refreshments.
- The Moreton Parish Council Open Meeting and the turning on of the Christmas lights, plus refreshments.

It's not often that one of our councillors becomes an MP, so congratulations to EFDC Councillor Gagan Mohindra who was elected Conservative Member of Parliament for the constituency of South West Hertfordshire.



Little Fires Everywhere by Celeste Ng



“Everyone in Shaker Heights was talking about it that summer: how Isabelle, the last of the Richardson children, had finally gone around the bend and burned the house down” - from this opening line, the rest of the novel goes back a year to show how the Richardson family come to lose their perfect Shaker Heights’ home and life.

Ng describes her book as a ‘novel about race, and class and privilege. Shaker Heights, Ohio, is one of America’s first planned communities, a community where every aspect of life is mapped and ordered, from the colours of the houses to the immaculate lawns and rubbish collection, and the perfect, upper middle-class lives of the inhabitants.


Elena Richardson is the embodiment of Shaker Heights’ principles, believing that by following the rules and leading an ordered, planned life, disaster and tragedy can be averted. The novel revolves around three very different families and how their lives cross and intermingle in unlikely ways. Into the Richardson’s lives bursts single-parent Mia and her daughter Pearl who become tenants of the Richardson’s and embody everything Shaker Heights is not. Mia is a free-spirited artist with a blatant disregard for the rules and she and Pearl become intertwined in the Richardson’s lives.

When Elena’s friends attempt to adopt a Chinese-American baby, resulting in a fierce custody battle, the community is divided, and Mia and Elena find themselves on opposite sides resulting in Elena determined to uncover Mia’s secret past with devastating results for her own family.

The interracial adoption and trial drive the latter part of the novel and unravel everyone’s pre-conceived ideas about motherhood, surrogacy, abortion, adoption, and ultimately question “What made someone a mother? Was it biology alone, or was it love?”

Crooked Heart by Lissa Evans



This book has been compared to *Paper Moon* and I can understand why. It is basically a black comedy set in World War 2, chronicling an unlikely friendship between a small-time con lady and a young boy (an orphan who has been evacuated).

Vera Sedgewick is the 36 year old widow who takes him in at a time when she is drowning in debts and dependents. The boy, Noel, is mourning his Godmother Mattie who we find out was a former suffragette who, up until the point of death, was in the depths of dementia. Noel has a wise head on young shoulders, with a disdain for authority. He has little in common with other children (due to the fact he had never mixed with them) and even less with

the impulsive Vee (Vera).

As the war provided various opportunities for making money she teams up with Noel, visiting the bombed suburbs of London and 'collecting' via a mobile donation box for people who have been traumatically affected by the war. As they start to make a profit Noel is drawn out of his shell, however events conspire against them...

This book shows how, through adversity, people are drawn together in what eventually becomes a love story between a woman whose own son shows her no affection and Noel, who needs so desperately to be loved but has a hard exterior.

Humour runs constantly through this book and caused me to laugh out loud many times.

It is well worth reading as I believe it captures the adversity of lives captured in the banality of war.


